Root vegetables should be carefully washed. Stalks and leaves neatly trimmed to 7.5cm (3 inch). Vegetables should be blemish-free, evenly matched and evenly coloured. Display directly on the show bench, plates are not needed.

43 Three carrots.

SALAD CLASSES

Salads should be fresh, clean and evenly matched. Radishes are shown as a tied bunch complete with foliage. Any container may be used, including upcycled products.

44 One planted container of mixed salad leaves.
Maximum container size 28cm (11 inch) diameter.

45 One planted container of more than three salad crops
(eg salad onion, lettuce, carrots, radish, beetroot, tomatoes etc).
Maximum container size 28cm (11 inch) diameter.

46 Two lettuce.

47 Six radishes.

OTHER CLASSES (VEGETABLES)

48 Six stems of asparagus.

49 One cabbage.

50 Three sticks of rhubarb with only 7.5cm (3 inch) of leaf blade.

51 Any vegetable (not specified above).

52 Collection of cut fresh herbs for culinary use, five distinct kinds, name and stage in separate vessels, displayed for best visual effect.

THE 'CHAMBER OF TRADE' CUP

Awarded for best exhibit in this section. A cash prize of £5 will be awarded to the cup winner. Cash prizes of £3, £2 and £1 will be awarded in all other classes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

All fruit should be ripe, with the exception of gooseberries, which may be shown unripe. Specimens should be well matched, clean and blemish-free. Fruit has a natural bloom on its surface and this should be retained if possible and not washed off. Stalks and calyces should be left on and fresh. The plant foliage should be used to decorate the exhibit.



A small arrangement suitable for a table display to be viewed from all sides. The exhibit should include fragrant, seasonal garden flowers and foliage. It must be staged in a container, pot, or vase containing water to ensure freshness at the time of presentation to His Majesty The King. No accessories or floral foam are permitted.

Strict Notice Finished design to be no taller than 18cm (7 inch) and with a diameter no larger than 18cm (7 inch) – tea plate size – or 18cm (7 inch) along its longest edge. Competitors must adhere to these instructions to be eligible for selection.

Floral exhibits in Class Nos 64-66 will be judged in accordance with The National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies (NAFAS) Competitions' Manual, Fourth Edition 2023, available from nafas.org.uk.

Supplementary Rules and Definitions for Floral Arrangements: All competitors must ensure that all drapes, backings and props used in their exhibits are fixed firmly.

THE 'WINDSOR GOLDEN ROSE' TROPHY

'Garden Bounty'

An arrangement of fresh plant material in an upcycled container. Plant material must include flowers, greenery, fruit and vegetables. No floral foam or accessories permitted. 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RULES FOR COMPETITORS

1. Entries

- Entries must be made using the official **Competition Application Form** via www.rwrhs.com or the paper form (page 47).
- Paper entries to: **RWRHS, c/o ComXo, 18 Horton Road, Datchet, SL3 9ER.**
- **Closing date: Monday 1 June 2026.** Late entries will not be accepted.
- There is no charge for competition entries.

2. Exhibits

- One exhibit per person per class only.
- All plants, flowers, foliage, fruit and vegetables must be grown by the competitor in their own garden or allotment. Floral arrangement classes are exempt.
- The Society may inspect gardens or allotments before or after the Show.
- Competitors who have entered 12 or more classes may be given a complimentary admission pass. This must be requested in advance by emailing entries@rwrhs.co.uk
- All entries must comply with the instructions outlined in the schedule to be eligible for competition selection

3. Staging Times

Exhibits may be staged at the Show Ground only at the following times:

- **Friday 5 June 2026:** 3.00pm – 10.00pm
- **Saturday 6 June 2026:** 6.00am – 8.30am

Last admission to the marquee and issue of exhibit cards: **8.00am Saturday.** All competitors must clear the show ground by **8.30am Saturday** to allow for judging to commence. Competitors are encouraged to arrive on Friday evening or early Saturday morning to ensure there is ample time to stage their exhibits.

4. Exhibit Cards

- Final collection of exhibit cards from the **Competition Marquee desk** by **8.00am.**
- Cards must be placed **name face down** in front of the correct exhibit.

5. Judging

- All exhibitors must leave the marquees by **8.30am.**
- Judging starts at **9.00am on Saturday 6 June.**
- Judges will have no conflicting interests.
- Judges' decisions are final, subject to Rule 12.

6. Banksian Medal

The RHS Banksian Medal is awarded to the competitor gaining the most points in Horticultural Classes 2–55.

7. Prizes

- Prize Giving: **4.00pm on the Terrace.**
- Only one prize per class may be awarded to any competitor.
- Prizes may be withheld if exhibits are not of sufficient quality.
- Prize money must be collected from the Treasurer **3.00pm–5.00pm, Saturday 6 June,** or it will be forfeited.

8. Challenge Cups and Trophies

- Cups and trophies are held by the competitors for one year.
- They must be returned by **Monday 27 April to Friday 1st May, between 9.00am and 5.00pm to RWRHS, ComXo, 18 Horton Road, Datchet** (Tel: 01753 449 449).
- Winners are encouraged to have trophies engraved.

9. Removal of Exhibits

- After judging, exhibits must not be altered or removed before 5.00pm on Saturday 6 June.
- Exhibits may be removed between 5.00pm - 7.00pm on Show day, or between 8.00am - 12.00 noon on Sunday 7th June.
- All remaining exhibits will be disposed of.

10. Roses (Special Rules)

- Only registered or commercially available cultivars may be shown.
- No artificial aid is permitted, except discreet supports to keep blooms upright.
- Only natural foliage on the exhibited stems may be shown unless stated otherwise.
- Overdressed blooms will be penalised.
- Blooms left tied or pelleted may lose up to 3 points per bloom.

11. Vases and Bowls

- Vases for Rose, Sweet Pea and Cut Flower classes are available on loan and must be left in the marquee.
- A limited number of bowls are available; competitors are advised to bring their own.

12. Protests

- Any three Committee members may disqualify an exhibit in exceptional circumstances.
- Protests must be submitted in writing to the Treasurer by 2.00pm on Show Day, with a £5 fee.
- The fee is refunded if the protest is upheld.
- The Committee's decision is final.

13. Liability

All exhibits and personal property are entered at the competitor's own risk. The Society accepts no liability for loss or damage.


14. Vehicles
